For the year of 1984 we will have to make some changes both to the income side and expenditure side. Our current membership fee of \$5 is far too low. In New South Wales the fee is \$20 per year. A fee increase of say, \$3 per year bringing the fee to \$8 per year for Seniors and \$5 for Juniors gives the C.A.Q. at least some money to allow us to have tournaments of National Importance such as Australian Opens or Championships.

On the expenditure side you notice QCN sozking up large sums of money, obviously something has to be done here. At present it is only donations that

keep the magazine going.

The other point on the expenditure that worries the Pres. of the CAQ is the amount of money used to subsidize tournaments. Clubs should be using some of their own funds here. Clubs here such as $\frac{\text{Toowoomba}}{\text{Toowoomba}}$ and $\frac{\text{Redcliffe}}{\text{Redcliffe}}$ annually run good tournaments and never ask for subsidies.

Clubs are asked to leave the Sept. school holidays free as this is traditionally the time for the queensland Chess Championship.

QLD Womens Championships

The 1983 Queensland Womens Chess Chempionships were won this year by Nerida Fowell. Nerida for many years has been scoring persistently well in tournaments but always failed to take top honors. This year her more aggressive style of chess has paid dividends, and it will be interesting to see how she performs in the Australian Womens. It was unfortunate that Janeen Glover was unavailable, as her play has been on a par with the top women on the Olympiad team.

Alia Zile for many years the top women player, will undoubtly be a very a determined customer next year. Third place went to Andrea Terry, and being the highest scoring junior was awarded the Qld Junior Girls Title. Andrea's play was strategically awful, however she made up for this by the sharpness of her play. Helen Russell though scoring badly, played very well and should have scored more points. Karen Smith and Renate Szimke both put in good performances and they are both players to watch next year.

Chess in Australia recently bought up the issue of government funding towards chess. In queensland the government does recognize chess as a sport, and does have provisions for the funding of chess. To obtain these funds certain guidelines must be followed, this idea of a blank cheque to be spent how the organization best sees fit is ludicrious. Until we can find some direction, chess will continue to stagnate.

Queensland over the last few years has been following the American method of having large tournaments with lucrative prizemoney, organized by chees clubs with the state assoc stepping in only with the overall planning. This approach has many failings as we are experiencing in queensland; not only has it failed to produce any strong players (there actually seems a decline in strength of chessplayers), it has also left queensland the poorest of State organizations. From this we can see that large prizemoney in itself is not sufficient to raise the level of Queensland chess.

More intelligent, goal-orientated planning is first required. Then queensland chess can take advantage of our government's sporting funds.







JUNIOR QUEENSLAND

Tim Allen

The 1983 State Junior Titles was one of the most interesting and competive Junior tournaments for many years. Its 59 entrants, slightly more than last year " make it one of the years biggest tournaments, with players coming from all over Queensland, from New South Wales and even one competitor from the Solomon Islands.

The top two seeds. Mark Robertson and New South Wales Junior Chamuion Tim Heilly proved too strng for the other competitors, dropping only half a point and two half points respectively. Mark won the \$300 U18 first prize and

Tim took the U16 first prize of \$100.

On 61 points were Brendon Downs and Tim Allen, who shared the U18 division and Andrew Gill who won the U14 division. It is a little unfortunate that Andrew lives in Townsville as in Brisbane he could gain strong competition to become one of Australias leading juniors. In the U16 division second place was shared by Chris Muller, David Appleton and Adrian Duncan who is making a welcome return to chess, on 6 points, with Chris winning the U16 trophy on countback. Second place in the U14 was Craig Duxbury on 6 points.

The U12 division was won by Martin Nerowski, with Trevor Holloway coming second and David Evans tieing with Liam Glover for third place. In the U14 division

third place was shared by George Lester and Luke Berry.

The Girls prize donated by the Womens Chess League was won by Andrea Terry who scored 5 points. The Pancake Manor donated prizes for Brisbane secondary school students and these were won by Mark Robertson, Damian Gaffney and Mitchell Rologas. Mitchell can claim some sort of record, drawing 6 of his 9 games !

Director of Play, Jameen Glover frightened the players into unusually good manners and behavior, thereby allowing the tournament to run smoothly.

It is hoped to see all the players back in January competing for the Metr-lien Junior Chess Championships, as this tournament will greatly enhance a players chances of competing for Australia overseas.

BOOK REVIEW: Chess for Children .-- John Harris

John Harris, 1976 Queensland Chess Champion and school teacher from Marybourgh, has compiled this beginners book especially for children. This book is totally basic in that it fully concentrates on teaching the fundamentals of the game. I would suggest this book as leading on to more advanced beginners books such as Furdy's Guide to good chess or Bobby Fischer teaches chess. The art of Chess analysis -- Jan Timman (International Grandmaster)

This book is superb for the experienced tournament player. It gets rid of these adjectives to determine positions and deals only with the truth on the board. Next time you get a position you are unsure of .: eg. is it time for a tactical thrust, or just sit . Timman will show you the correct method of executing these ideas. Price \$10.65 plus postage (approx. \$1) available from Neville Ledger - Tasmania.

The Editor suggests books from Pergammon Press as being of a consistently high standard with a large number of International Grandmasters working for them. Batsford Books are still on the wane.

D'VID LOVEJOY: This year's title is David's chance to vindicate his winning performance in 1981. Since Davids 1981 Australian Championship result his play seems to have improved markedly. David seems to put quite a lot of preparation into each game and with the chance of again playing in the Australian Chess Championship we should expect a good performance.

JOHN MYERS: John was co-winner of last year's championship. John this year has been having a terribly lean trot, it is not often John goes a year without winning a tournament. If Johns main rivals are not up to their best then he should sneak through.

M'RK ROBERTSON: Mark is the only international in the field! He represented fustralia at the World U16 championship last year. He confronts the championship a little underdone, since his only chess this year has been a couple of Junior events and the Aust. Open. A good 4-1 shot.

MIKE KUZELANSKY: Last year's title was significant for a number of things. One was Mike's absence. Mikes relentless aggressive style has captured this one many a time. Smyslov has a sim'lar age to Mike and is performing OK this year. Ill health has plagued Mike this year however don't write him off.

FETER O'NEILL: No player in Queensland is safe against Peter, tactically he probably is the strongest in wLD. If Peter realizes that 7-9 should win he may play more carefully in the games that don't suit him. Anything better than 3-1 would be a good bet.

COLIN HOLLOWY: Colin is tough. Colin's chances in this event should come from inaccurate play by his opponents, rather than smashing wins by daring play. This event will probably help toughen Colin up to be a leading contender for many tournaments in the future.

 $\frac{\text{D'MIAN NORRIS}}{\text{best in round}}$: Damian will try to break his bogey of not performing the best in round robin events. If he decides to do a little preparation he may perform better than expected with many of his bogey players missing from this event. 5-1

FILOMENO ZAMORRA: Many players are not too familar with Filomeno. A former srong Cuban player who helped with the Havana Olympiad, today mostly player only lightning chess. If Filomeno brushes up in the opening he may score a few upsets. 7-1

TERRY DUNNE: Terry will be lacking anyone to back him in this event. Since moving to Brisbane Terry has greatly improved by getting to play strong players, however it will be difficult to see him getting more than 3 points.

BICHARD ROND: Rick's the long shot, 30-1. Richard does not rely on theory or solid play to score his points. He waits on you to castle then shifts his pieces over there for the 10 to 1 shot of pulling off a swindle. In a swiss event Rick's theory may work.

LATE NEWS: It has been reported that Kasparov has withdrawn playing Korchnoi due to the unwillingness of the U.S. authorities to allow the Russians a full array of assistants. Smyslov has also withdrawn from playing Ribili according to AAP.



Reflections on the Grand Prix

· And some chess in Mt Isa.

We have just experienced our first big money circuit of queensland chess. In many respects it was an outstanding success: two Olympiad players competed, large entries were received at all G.F. legs and organization was little less than perfect in Townsville and Rockhampton.

(With respect to the Brisbane Club-Gap Open I cannot for the life of me justify the non-adjournment of games in some rounds and adjournments for the marathon battles at other times. There is a crucial need for directors to maintain uniformity throughout an event. Fairings are effected by adjournment and non-adjournment. The distortions caused by assigned results at some times and the inconveneus of waiting around at other times means two things.

- a) the swiss draw, a fragile thing at best, is thrown open to even more variables
 - b) players who drive do so in an even greater state of mental exhaustion.
 One evil should have been good enough.

Perhaps I am hyper-sensitive but it sure felt like a razor's edge at the Gap. A number of players spent as much time looking at other games as their own and one non-competitor made her presence felt throughout. Surely, when someone is in desperate time trouble he doesn't need a loud, piercing voice to shout, "Hurry,.... is losing." from next to him to people at the other end of the playing area. In extreme cases the idea of a leash and muzzle seems appropriate.

I am confident that the large sums of money at stake <u>reduced</u> chess players to one of the lowest forms of life- the stroppy, neurotic and whinging tournament bridge player. There is a definite need for maturity when lots of dollars are involved and this will happen, as Grand Prix's are adjusted to. No fault can be found with the concept so it is a matter of people taking that long last step to adulthood.

The title above makes mention of a poorly attended tournament, the Mt Isa Open. Thanks to the B.S.D. Club this was quite a rich event.

For various reasons (distance mainly) it attracted only sixteen players. Two outstanding features did, however, emerge. The local contingent of nine players, not disheartened by the low numbers, kicked in sizable sums towards the 1985 Commonwealth Championships, planned for Townsville. There wasn't one Townsville player present! (The C.A.g. is setting up a special account for donations.)

After the Open, a fellow called Olavi Falo was with most other players at an impromptu lightning tournament. I photo of a much younger Olavi, titled "B.s.D. Champion 1957", adorns the wall. That was when the Isa supplied State champions almost at will, so he couldn't have been a bad player.

Olavi doesn't speak much anglish and age has severed distanced him from his former playing strength but Boy!, does he know some chess studies!

Romantic idiot I may be, but in a months' chess, that evening around a set with Olavi was very nearly the highlight. I suspect it would have been if I'd won some money, too.
