The age old disappointment of lack of ratings information is being fixed thanks to John Gray, Bruce Holliday and Ray Adams. Ray has spent many hours working out provisional ratings by hand and adding them to the list—thanks Ray.

I hope that next year we may be able to start a Queensland Grand Prix with a \$1000 first prize. The Grand Prix, which would be Australia's first event of this type, could involve 10 Queensland Chess Clubs and can make us the number one chess State in Australia!

We have introduced a new constitution for the C.A.Q. this year, which means power is now back in the hands of the clubs instead of a few executive members.

We are hosting the Australian Open from 27.12.80 to 11.1.81 and that is where you can help! Have a go and enter this tremendous event. Don't worry about not being good enough as players of all strengths will be competing. You never know you may even get to play International Master Bill Hartston whom we have secured, through the Australian Chess Federation, for the event. Please play, but if you can't any other help you can afford us would be appreciated.

Finally, let me tell you about our great new membership increase. In 1961 the C.A.Q. had 350 members—18 years later in 1979 there were 368 members, just 18 more! This year we have over 500 members and we are still growing. My thanks to all people who have become involved in chess this year. I hope this magnificent effort will continue into 1981.

I wish you and your family a Merry Christmas and a happy new chess year.

UP NORTH

The Townsville Chess Club and the Townsville Junior Chess League are looking forward to the start of a joint dream-the first chess centre in Queensland.

An application is before the Townsville City Council for an area of leased land on

which the chess centre can be built.

It is hoped the centre will be completed in time for the start of the 1981 school year. The Townsville Chess Club is now the largest in Australia. It has 196 registered members and a contact list of more than 400 people in North Queensland.

The Townsville Junior Chess League was started 18 months ago and already has a list of 1200 students from primary and secondary schools in Townsville who are

playing chess in schools.

Members of the Townsville Chess Club have already donated or pledged \$20,000 towards the centre, which will offer unparalleled facilities for the playing of chess.

The president of the Townsville Junior Chess League, Mr. O. Sencariuc, said. "Already the league has difficulty in providing a suitable venue for all the students participating in our weekend inter-school chess tournaments. There is a real need for a suitable playing centre for the 1200 students who have so far told us they are playing chess.'

The centre would allow up to 200 players to compete at the same time.

The president of the Townsville Chess Club, Mr. C. Fotinos said: "The centre will allow major Australian chess tournaments to be held in Townsville. Our 1980 North Queensland championships attracted players from even Sydney. Many more will come to Townsville if we have the facilities to stage events of this size."

It is envisaged that the centre would be open on afternoons and evenings and

weekends for school children, and at night for adult players.

In the three weeks before leaving for Europe, Alain Pardoen donated his services to promoting chess in Townsville schools. Alain, 22, of Brisbane scored an international success by winning the Dutch reserves championship from a field of 160 top players. His success also won an invitation to the prestigious Dutch championship, in which he will compete against a field of grandmasters.

Alain gave many regional simul displays besides those in Townsville, visiting

Ingham, Ayr, Home Hill and finally, Mt. Isa.

The Mt. Isa players were particularly tough, as they were fifteen years ago when Grandmaster Alexander Kotov had to concede four games to players he met in displays there.

Like Kotov, Alain had to concede four losses. The winners were Wayne Fraser (Mt. Isa Champion), Joe Renwick, Jan Van Ryt and Willi Strauss, who was one of the players who toppled Kotov!

Alain also gave a successful public exhibition at the prestigous Barkly Motel, where

he was guest of manager Ray Hemmink.

According to Alain, this would be a magnificent venue for a tournament and I wonder if next year we will see the first Mt. Isa Open at the Barkly?

Ipswich Open by Bruce Holliday

Fresh from his State Championship victory Qld. Champion Colin Morris was not too surprisingly outright winner, though he was fortunate to draw against Qld. Junior Champion Damian Norris.

Colin won the rest but because of the accelerated draw, failed to meet archrival Juan Kloostra until round four. His last round win over me was a lyrical

performance against my lacklustre opening.

Experience defeated youth in the last round encounter between Kloostra and Norris. This created an equal second place between Kloostra, Holliday

and Ray Adams, half a point behind the leader.

Kloostra had previously lost a slightly superior endgame by trying too hard to capitalize on my time trouble. Ray Adams' first round loss to Ray Vicie Snr. meant that he had easier opposition throughout, but nevertheless deservedly won the 1401-1600 trophy a full point in front of other contenders.

Young chess wizard Damian Norris did not perform enough magic to win a major prize but was consoled by the best junior award instead. Mrs. Anna Anskey is making a regular habit of picking up a ladies prize and this tournament was no exception. Old. Girls Champion Nerida Powell appropriately won the girls prize. Other prizes: 1201-1400 Steve Clarry; under 1200-Ross White; unrated Graeme Nott. Incentive Prize-John Foster.

It was heartening to see 80 year old Oscar Shank of Bundaberg playing his first tournament. Having to use a clock and score the games were handicaps he was not accustomed to.

The tournament was again held at the Ipswich Boys Grammar School and conducted by the local club under the leadership of Bill Powell. Welcome were the on the spot refreshments which gave the tournament an extra flavour.

1980 Queensland Championship

11 players battled for the 1980 Queensland Championship. Residents of Townsville, Rockhampton, Gold Coast and Brisbane were among them,

including four former State champions.

These four clashed in the first round. Myers and Truscott, normally aggressive players, grappled for a dozen moves before splitting the point. Kuszelansky and Morris contested their usual slugging match—I sacked a pawn, Kuz sacked a rook, I counter-sacked a rook, Kuz blundered a rook

By round 4, Myers and Morris had a slight lead over Kuszelansky. In our crucial encounter I slapped a bind on Myers' cramped position. His weird

contortions led to self-destruction.

Kuszelansky fell further behind. Why does he always lose so decisively to

Alain Pardoen? Holliday, after three draws, trounced Truscott.

Spurred on by the taste of blood, Holliday attacked viciously against the tournament leader. I collected a wayward bishop as Bruce engineered a king-side attack. In the flurry of time-pressure, an end-game was reached where three pawns compensated the lost piece. A draw was agreed. I had met the strongest opponents.

Following that round, Morris led by half a point from Myers and Pardoen.

Then came an eventful night of play.

Tony Truscott, fresh from a bye, fell to a lightning counter-attack by improved Leo Wilkinson. Holliday and Pardoen clashed in the battle of time-trouble addicts. With hands flying and flags raised, Bruce proposed a draw. A sly move to obtain a bye next round?

Myers had Kuszelansky on the ropes but faltered under time pressure. As

Kuz delivered a snap mate, he was a happy man.

With one round to go, Morris led by a point from Pardoen. Other leaders had slipped in round 7.

Playing white against Peter Hainsworth, I offered an early draw to secure

first prize. Elsewhere, battles raged for second and third places.

Pardoen's encounter with Truscott resulted in a brawl between D.O.P., players and onlookers. Pardoen claimed a win on time, the D.O.P. ruled playon. Peace finally prevailed when a draw was agreed. For the third time, Alain Pardoen finished second in the State Championship.

Myers produced one of his better end-games to oust a luckless Holliday. The only loss for Bruce, but five draws left him out of the prize list. Myers shared 3rd and 4th places with Kuszelansky, the latter having a well-deserved

bye.

Games Section

For our games in this issue we turn to the world of correspondence chess and the games of International Correspondence Master Max Salm. Max was awarded the I.C.M. title in 1962 when he finished fourth in the World Correspondence Championships (won by Grandmaster O'Kelly). As well as being Australian Correspondence Champion twice Max has won the Queensland over-the-board title on several occasions and is also noted for his opening innovations in the Winawer, Sicilian and King's Indian Defences.

Australians in The World XI Semi-Final

The XI Correspondence Semi-Final Individual Tourneys, which commenced in 1975, comprised 8 groups of 13 players in each. Entry was allotted to the winners of recently completed ICCF Master Tourneys, qualifiers from the previous Semi-Final (a 60% score being necessary), and representatives from each affiliated nation according to a quota system. Grandmasters as such were eligible to participate.

Australia was well represented numerically. Lucius Endzelins took part as a Grandmaster and both Karlis Ozols and myself qualified from the previous Semi-Final. Australia was allowed three other representatives and chosen were John Purdy, Dr. B. Puzenjak and P. W. Thompson (the then Australian Correspondence Champion). In previous Semi-Finals, only the winner of the Sonneborn System qualified for the Final but this time an intermediate \(\frac{3}{4} \) Final (of three sections) was introduced and entry was relaxed to the first and second place-getters.

The Event concluded in 1979 and our players fared as follows:

Section 1: Dr. B. Puzenjak (10th) 5 points

2: M. Salm (equal Second) 8½ points

3: P. Thompson (12th) 4 points

4: L. Endzelins (11th) 3½ points

6: J. Purdy (12th) I point

8: K. Ozols (10th) 4½ points.

I thus qualified to play in the ensuing \(^3\) Final but owing to personal commitments at the time was not able to compete but presumably this eligibility will carry over to the XII \(^3\) Final. The winner of my section was Norwegian Oystein Sande with a very meritorious \(^9\) points. Tieing with me was A. Woizech, the 1975 USSR Correspondence Champion. Unplaced was the Soviet CC Grandmaster, J. Morosow, on \(^9\) points. My own game with Sande was very keenly contested and perhaps my "little combination" deserved a better fate. Here is the score:



The following game is also from this Tourney and is interesting inasmuch as chess literature abounds with quick White wins against the Sicilian featuring, as here, a typical Knight sacrifice on Q5. My opponent is Rainer Stockigt, of East Germany, a most aggressive player, who scored an impressive win against Woizech, who incidentally was the only player to beat the clear winner, Sande. I had no losses, 5 wins, 7 draws. As it transpired, Stockigt's just so sacrifice did not bear fruit but could it have been productive?


